







Student Highlights

Over the past year, Griot Arts was able to accomplish several major goals. At the beginning of 2020, Griot launched its very own, student-led podcast! This podcast was designed to give students the opportunity to explore the history of the blues and the heritage of their community. Five podcasts have been published to date and they have been downloaded over 250 times! You can find these podcasts on all major streaming services, so go take a listen to hear from our students first hand! Griot also completed its first ever student-led documentary film, which premiered at the 2020 Clarksdale Film Festival. In the process of making this film, local filmmaker. Nolan Dean, worked with students on both visual and oral storytelling skills as he guided them through an exploration of the Blues in Clarksdale, MS.

In June, Griot Arts also launched an instrument rental program! With a grant provided by Teach For America Greater Delta Region, we were able to purchase 20 additional instruments for our students to use exclusively at home. By providing rental instruments free of charge, this program created a very affordable option for students who wanted to continue cultivating their creative skills outside of our program hours.

Sage student Kendal Mosley (stage name KenKenStar) used the Griot recording studio to record her




popular single "Rude Dude," now available on Spotify.

Griot Blues, a student made documentary on the history of Blues in Clarksdale, can be found on YouTube by visiting the Griot Youth Program channel.




Instrument rentals during quarantine.

Griot was also able to accomplish several operational and finance goals. For the first time, Griot has built and maintained a reserve fund equalling 20% of our annual operating budget. The creation and maintenance of this reserve fund is a critical step in ensuring the financial stability of our organization. We have also completed the development of a new CRM donor management system that will allow us to better manage, cultivate, and steward our donor base. We have also renewed our board's commitment to fundraising, and updated our giving policy to reflect our goal of 100% board giving.



A WORD TO OUR DONORS

Griot Arts is incredibly thankful for its funders, partners, and board members whose support makes our programming possible. In December, Griot Arts received a two-year grant from the Walton Family Foundation in support of both our after school arts program and the Meraki job training program. This grant was used to support our incredible teaching artists and our Meraki fellows, among several other key areas of our programming. We also received grants from the Community Foundation of Northwest Mississippi and the Maddox Foundation for the purpose of strengthening the academic component of our program and to provide technology to our students so they can learn remotely. With the support of these foundations, we were able to bring former Principal and Educator. Cassandra Winters onto staff. She brings over twenty years of educational experience to our team and we are thrilled to be working alongside her to serve our students. Additionally, we received a generous operating grant from the Mississippi Arts Commission (MAC).

MAC has been an incredible advocate for Griot Arts for over five years and we are proud to continue partnering with them to provide arts education to students in our community. Lastly, we are excited to continue our partnership with the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA). Clarksdale's roots go deep and are rich with creativity and musical history. Our project with the NEA has been to connect our students with this history and to have them experience it for themselves through the arts. Private foundation and corporate grants include Phil Hardin Foundation, Classics For Kids Foundation, Teach For America Greater Delta Region, Community Foundation of West North Carolina. Bob and Marie Gallo Foundation, Community Foundation of East Central Illinois, and the Pinkerton Foundation.

More than ever, as we move forward we commit to grow our Christ-like community and encourage our students to be their best, creative selves as they use their voices to positively shape their community.
